

#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

Last month I had something to say about worship—I tried to show the importance of having a band of committed Christians at the very centre of things, leading our community and I have been persuaded to say what I mean when I talk about 'Committed Christians'.'

Committed Christians are first and foremost people who are passionately in love with their Lord. They delight in His Presence and so, often draw near to Him in prayer. Not content with ordinary vocal prayer, they seek to learn something of meditation and mental prayer by which they will come to hear His Voice directing and controlling their lives. The business of Sunday worship never presents a problem for them, they are too fond of their Lord to disregard His dying command, 'Do this in remembrance of Me' They willingly accept the age long tradition of the Church 'The Lord's Service for the Lord's People on the Lord's Day'

They always keep before them Our Lord's example of humility and love, remembering how He emptied Himself and took the form of a servant and Who, on the last night

of His life, humbly washed His disciples feet.

Committed Christians too, will refrain from contemtuous thoughts one of another and the faults that they see in others must be subjects for prayer rather than criticism. They will always be on their guard against the hasty retort and the angry gesture, never failing to ask forgiveness of any thing against whom they have sinned.

Finally, they will remember that they are the followers of the Son of Man who came eating and drinking. Who blessed little children, and Who was the friend of outcasts and sinners. They will delight in laughter and good fellowship and most certainly will not wear long faces.

It is the purpose of Christ to work miracles through His Servants. To do this effectively they must be emptied of self and utterly surrendered to Him. When this is done they become chosen vessels of His Spirit and effective instruments of His mighty working.

#### THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear People,

This Easter letter will no doubt be in your hands by Easter Day, April 6th, with its message of 'The Third Day'—The Resurrection of Jesus is celebrated by more people in more places on the face of the globe than any other single event in human history. Yet I daresay a good many of the crowds who throng our churches on Easter Day are not at all quite sure that the event they are celebrating really happened. They are not dogmatic one way or the other; they are just quietly doubtful. They do not ask too many questions. They just run on the old tracks that were laid down generations ago; they go through the resurrection routine. When spring comes it means new life to them, and they enjoy responding to the Resurrection story of the Gospel by singing the great Easter hymns. But they long to know for certain whether that story is fact or fiction.

There are many convincing arguments that can be brought forward to prove the truth of the Resurrection to those whose minds are sufficiently sincere to be convinced. There is the argument of the New Testament book. You cannot account for this book except by the fact of the resurrection of Christ from the dead. There is the argument of the New Testament men. You cannot account for Peter and Paul, the difference between the men they were and the men they became, except by way of a miracle, and that miracle is the miracle of the Risen Christ. There is the argument of the New Testament Church, which conquered the mighty empire of Rome, although that empire did everything in its power to destroy it. You cannot explain the survival and growth of the Church for 2000 years in spite of bitter persecution, savage controversy, dreadful scandals, frightful bigotry, except by way of the same Easter miracle. The secret of the Church's everlasting life in her everlasting Lord.

I believe that it happened, that on the third day Jesus Christ rose from the dead, that Jesus in some form or other confronted the people that He knew and loved, and they saw Him. They knew that He was alive, and that His spirit could be in them, and that the love of God, which was in Him, was King above all for ever and ever. That is a fact. But one can argue about it till Doomsday and produce all the arguments which are accepted as valid, and which caused an eminent lawyer once to say that on all the evidence available, the fact for the resurrection is proven beyond a shadow of doubt. But until that day comes, when in some form or other He overtakes us on our way and we know from our own personal experience that Love rises from the dead with all the

#### ADVENT SUNDAY

(November 27th, 1955)

At the Parish church of S. Mary the Virgin, a large congregation was present when the Bishop of Grantham administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to eighteen confirmees from wi hin the parish. They were presented by the Vicar. The senior server John Dixon acted as Bishop's Chaplain.

At S. Michael's Church in the presence of a crowded Church heard the Bishop preach at a service of Dedication The Vicar conducted the Service. Mr R. Drury acted as Bishop's Chaplain. The lessons were read by Mr W. R.

Beardall and Mr R. A. C. Tunnard.

Led by the choir the Bishop proceeded to the main door; And on opening the door handed the key to the Vicar. The Bishop said prayers and blessed the Hall, in the presence of a large gathering. Whilst enjoying light refreshments his Lordship heard the Vicar mention that this was indeed a red letter day for both Frampton and Frampton West, to have the Bishop of Grantham in their midst. Also how grateful the Vicar was to all the voluntary workers and the contractors for their share in erecting and furnishing the Hall. The Vicar then called upon Mr Harold Daniels to thank the Bishop on behalf of the workers. In doing so Mr Daniels stressed the idea of having the hall built was to further the work of the Church: And to make the hall a community centre for all. The Hall would be available for bookings.

## THE OPENING OF S. MICHAEL'S CHURCH HALL ADVENT SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 27th

The Bishop preached a sermon on "village halls", and said it was his first visit to Frampton West. He said that the atom business could be settled in the village halls. There would always be war until people learned the secret of peace in the village halls. He said it is harder to live together in a village than in a big town; people never hardly know their neighbours in a town, but in a village everybody knows each other's business. The village balls are the places where people should meet to settle their points, have their rows and still remain the best of friends. He believed firmly that we shall learn the secret of unity in our village halls.

The Bishop then proceeded to the new hall and opened it and gave the blessing. The choir were in attendance.

The hall itself is a spacious building and is really a credit

to the people of Frampton West.

The first social event in the S. Michael's hall was the Christmas Bazaar. This was declared open by Mrs Jack Francis of Boston. The result of the effort brought £124 towards the hall fund.


