Frampton Gardening Club



A few years ago I planted a quince tree, having been inspired by a lovely tree in the gardens at Coton Manor in Northamptonshire, with leaves and blossom similar to an apple, and eventually, hard, yellow aromatic fruit. This year we were rewarded with our first crop of about 10lbs of quince, now, after a period of storage to allow them to mature, they are ready for cooking, and I'm attempting to

make Membrillo. This Spanish preserve is traditionally served with Manchego cheese, or in Provence as a Christmas dessert. Time will tell how successful I'm going to be, (the Membrillo is still drying in the oven) but at least I've managed to combine horticulture, cooking and Christmas in one article, and if all else fails, I have the beautiful blossom to look forward to next spring, and, at the moment, my kitchen is full of the aromatic perfume of quince, which has to be experienced to be believed. If anyone is tempted to plant a quince, you need a sunny site and space, unless you plant a dwarf variety in a pot, which will do well on a shady patio.

The September Club meeting of Frampton Gardening club entertained our members with a very interesting insight into the National Open Gardens Scheme, and was given by Sally Grant, the Lincolnshire Organiser and plantswoman. The NGS provides unique access to over 3,500 private gardens in England and Wales during the summer and raises impressive amounts of money for nursing and health charities. The charity is focusing this year on the importance of the role of gardening and gardens in helping to create a positive path to health, and raise awareness of the physical and mental health benefits of gardens and gardening.

In October the chairman of the club Ray Harding, a keen amateur bryologist, gave an interesting illustrated talk about the amazing World of Mosses, a much underrated but fascinating species. The slides magnified the colour, beauty and diversity of the plants, inviting us into a normally unseen, intimate world beneath our feet, or on a roof or wet rock face. Ray's active interest in observing, recording and classifying mosses and liverworts has lead him and his camera all over the UK in pursuit of a new addition to his collection.

The club's November meeting, on Thursday 28th November at Frampton Village Hall, at 7.30pm, the speaker for that evening being Dorothy Wood, a garden designer, who will give us help and guidance, and answer

horticultural related questions.

We do not have a December meeting, the last Thursday falling too close to Christmas, and instead have a New Year lunch at the Supreme, much anticipated and enjoyed by the members.

We have many varied speakers during the winter and spring months and two outings during the summer. These outings include visits to large houses and gardens and to more intimate ones, all with interesting plants and flowers for members to admire and be inspired by, usually with a chance to buy a little treasure or two. Our first meeting after Christmas is on Thursday 30th January, with entrance to the first meeting free and membership only £10 per year with £1 entrance per meeting, you can be assured of a warm welcome if you come along, with no horticultural knowledge needed, just a desire to enjoy flowers, plants and vegetables, and friendship of like minded people. Seasons greetings to you all and as Dicken's Tiny Tim said "God bless us, every one".

It gives me great pleasure to be able to reach you through this newsletter once again!

Supermarkets and businesses are competing with each other to utilise the Christmas season to maximise their profit. Television shows try to paint an image about the "Christmas Spirit" without alluding to it and or fudging the real reason or meaning of Christmas. Some of you may have seen merchandise as early as September and Christmas advertisements in October.

The Christmas advertisements of most major commercial establishments are out now. John Lewis ad starring Edgar the dragon says, "Show them how much you care", and Sainsbury's ad with Nicholas the sweep asks, "Well if you can't do something special for someone at Christmas when can you?" both, we could say have an underlying Christmas message. However, Marks and Spencer this year urges us to "go jumpers". A few years ago I remember Marks and Spencer turned into Magic and Sparkle.

The first Christmas was neither magic nor sparkle. There was no room in the inn, no midwife or gynaecologist but a stable, manger, swaddling clothes and a vulnerable baby. 



RSPB...A Mouse in the House

'Twas the night before Christmas, and all through the house. Not a creature was stirring, not even a mouse. But how true is this for you?

As the weather gets colder, people increasingly find they have mice living alongside them. I know this from personal experience myself. There are four different types of mice in the UK. Of these, harvest mice are unlikely to come indoors, which leave three possible visitors

House mice, as the name suggests, do normally live in and around houses and other buildings. Their body is 8 - 10 cm long, with a tail a little bit shorter than that. They have dull brown fur, lighter underneath. Eyes and ears are small and neat. In comparison, the eyes and ears of wood mice are much larger. Their fur is a richer brown and they have white tummies. Their tails are the same length as their bodies, at 8 - 11 cm long.



Finally there is the yellow-necked field mouse. This looks very similar to the wood mouse, but can be slightly larger. The key feature to look for is a large yellow spot on its throat. Both these two normally live out in the countryside, but as colder weather hits they can move into houses for the extra warmth.

How do you know when you have a mouse in the house? Well, for me the first thing I noticed was nibble marks on a box of chocolates left open overnight. Unforgiveable! Other foods might be attacked too, particularly packets at the back of cupboards. You may also notice their droppings or, with house mice, dark greasy marks along skirting boards. This shows particularly at corners of rooms. As they run along, they like to keep pressed up against the edge of the room for added safety.

So, if you do discover some unwanted guests, what should you do? Well firstly, make it hard for them to get in. A foam filler can be used to block holes. Though mice can get through unbelievably small holes, so be thorough. For the current residents, you can buy poisons. But many people (including me) prefer to use a humane trap. Baited with chocolate or peanut butter, this entices the mouse into a box before dropping a trapdoor behind it. You can then take it somewhere else and release it. I'd suggest taking it a couple of miles away though; else it'll just come back in!

A Good Read by Graham Rodwell



'Steps Along Hope Street' by the Rev. David Sheppard



This book caught my eye on a used book stall in Taunton Parish Church whilst on holiday in Somerset. Having always loved cricket I recognized the authors photograph on the front cover. He was, of course, the very successful opening bat for Sussex and England from 1950 to 1963. Having written an earlier book about his cricketing years, this one has only casual mentions of his cricket career. It traces his journey from leaving Cambridge University, entering the Church and his climb up the ladder to become Bishop of Liverpool in 1975.


Clearly a very religious person he states several times in the book that his answer to any personal worry or trouble was to put on his coat and "go for a walk with God"

He began his ministry as a curate in a Church in Islington, London, then becoming Warden of the Mayflower Family Centre, Canning Town. He remained in London as Bishop of Woolwich until he moved to Liverpool to be Anglican Bishop, working closely with the City's Roman Catholic Archbishop. He and his wife are now retired and live in the Wirral.

He was always working to improve the lot of deprived people and was not

afraid to clash with politicians and those in power if he felt people were being persecuted.

Although a little deep in parts, this book is an impelling and inspiring read and when I had finished it I had as much admiration for the author as a man as I had for him as a sportsman in my teenage years.
