Frampton Parish Council

May I start by saying Happy New Year to everyone.

A new year and, as always, new challenges. One of the biggest issues we have as a rural Parish here in Frampton, is keeping the environment clean and tidy. With no real village centre but stretching many miles in total, we don't possess a great numbers of litter bins. Walking and driving around the Parish you can often see fast food cartons and even plastic bags full of rubbish lying on the roadsides. I often think it would be easier for people to to keep all the cartons and wrappers together in the car and take home rather than throwing them out of the window. Am I "old school" or was I just brought up to know right from wrong? Fen road and Wyberton Low Road seem to pay the heaviest price from this unacceptable practice. These are the two main "back road" routes between Boston and Kirton.

There is currently a major initiative from Boston Borough Council (S..C.R.A.P.) to try and fight fly-tipping and littering. There are now considerable fines that can be imposed if someone is prosecuted for either of these practices. If you see someone littering or manage to get a vehicle registration you can report to the Borough Council to get the perpetrators fined. Most mobile phones these days have the facility to take a photograph, even better some of us now have dash cams fitted in our cars that can film situations. You can report incidents to Boston Bough Council on their website by going to www.mybostonuk.com/report-action-it On this site you can then go to the section "report it" and then to either the Fly-tipping or Littering option to place the information. Or you can e-mail flyswat@boston.gov.uk If you don't have the facilities to do this you can also report any incidences to the myself or the Clerk on the numbers shown in the front cover of the magazine.

On a more positive note, as you have seen in the magazine for many months now, we have been seeking people to join the Parish Council as we are three members short. We should have a complement of nine Councillors and currently are running with six. We have now had some interest in these positions and I hope to have some further news next issue.

Also can I take the opportunity to remind everyone that your Annual Parish meeting will be on Thursday April 16^{th} 2020 starting at 7.30pm. Come and listen to the reports of everything going on in the Parish followed by tea and cakes, etc.

Finally Friday 8th May will be the revised bank holiday to commemorate the 75th anniversary of V.E. Day so we hope to be lighting the Parish beacon along with other celebrations. Lets hope through February the rain recedes, the spring flowers start to appear and our lovely rural Parish looks more like it's very best.



Shepherd of Another Flock By David Wilbourne

I was attracted to this book because I noticed that the author was a former vicar of Helmsley a charming market town in North Yorkshire. I knew this town well having visited it several times whilst on family holidays in the North York Moors, an area which I have loved since my first visit many years ago.

The author tells of his varied experiences whilst he was incumbent there, and tells his story in a lovely way reminiscent of those two other Yorkshire authors, Gervase Phinn and James Herriot.

We hear of many of the local characters including the local squire, Lord Faversham, with whom the author had many a friendly argument about certain religious matters, Father Bert, a retired Cleric and one time rear gunner during W.W.2, Frank a singing shepherd and Eve a country woman with a mind of her own. There is also a wonderful 'laugh out loud' description of the verger swinging the incense, which the author likens to something from 'Strictly Come Dancing '.

Strangely, he always cycled on his numerous journeys around the Parish and knowing some of the many local hills and the intense winter weather I can appreciate how his legs must have felt at times

I can thoroughly recommend this book to anyone looking for an easy and enjoyable read

RSPB



Hello there! Chris, the Visitor Experience Manager from the RSPB nature reserve. Back again with a look at the best of this season's local wildlife.

If you've been down to the reserve recently you might notice we're bursting to the seams with birds. All our hard work is paying dividends, with record numbers of birds being seen. Two of the most common at this time of year are the lapwing and the golden plover.

The lapwing has probably the most different common names of any bird in Britain. Peewit is a common one, referring to the sound they make. But here in Lincolnshire the same noise (and hence the bird) was called a 'pyewipe'. There's even a Pyewipe Inn in Lincoln. Which is appropriate, as the county bird of Lincolnshire is indeed the lapwing. You can see it perched atop the county coat of arms. Oddly, no-one seems quite sure

where the name lapwing comes from. It might be to do with either the noise or the floppiness of their wings as they fly. Or it might be due to them pretending to have a broken wing as a ruse to draw predators away from their nest. All a bit of a mystery! The bird itself is quite lovely, with a bottle green back, white tummy and a black band across its chest. The birds also grow a long plume of feathers off the top of their head too,

just to add to the spectacle. Lapwings live here near Frampton all year round, though we do get quite a few more in the winter as birds from upland areas come to the coast to escape colder weather.

Golden plovers are related to lapwings (yet another name of the lapwing is the green plover), and definitely live up to their name. At this time of year they are a lovely golden brown colour, with yellow and black spangles on their back. We generally only see them for the winter, as they breed up in the highlands and in places like Iceland. But when we see them, do we see them! There are currently up to 14,000 at Frampton Marsh, covering the fields and chattering to one another. It is a wonderful sight to see (and hear). Even more so if they are spooked, as they all take to the skies. They twist and turn in an aerial ballet designed to confuse potential predators. Want to see some of the best of the local wildlife? Come down to the reserve over the next few weeks and see if you are a plover lover too.





Tastebuds....Hot Chicken Salad

Gillian arrived she had been making and eating hot chicken salad, it created a discussion on how people make it. I was stunned it had nothing to do with salad but sounded wicked! So I have found the recipe and can tell you that Gillian uses a tin of condensed mushroom soup instead of or mixed with, the mayo. I gather this is not an exact science recipe, use it as a guide line and get creative!

Ingredients:

Cooked chopped chicken 3 cups

Finely diced celery 2 cups

Mushrooms 1 cup

Red pepper 1/2cup

Slivered toasted almonds 1 cup

Chopped onion 1/4 cup

Grated cheese 1 cup

Juice of 1/2 lemon

Helmans Mayo 1 cup

yoghurt or sour cream 1 cup

Black pepper to taste

Additional grated cheese and crumbled plain crisps/cornflakes

Method: Mix it all together pile into a shallow oven proof dish, roughly level sprinkle with additional cheese—parmesan is good—and sprinkle with crushed crisps or cornflakes to lightly cover—odd I know but it works!

Cook: oven 350F or 175C for 30 /40 mins - eat slowly


