Developing Legacy Giving in Your Church

Online sessions with Eleanor Stead, Deputy National Giving Advisor

According to the 2021 Anglican Giving Survey undertaken by the CofE, Anglicans are three times as likely to leave a legacy to other charities as they are to church. One of the reasons for this may well be as a result of one of the Survey's other findings; that only 15% of Anglicans have ever been asked to leave a legacy to their church. Of those who have, the most common reason for doing so was that they had been asked. That being the case, it is important that people are asked. A significant part of that is providing information about why legacies are needed by our churches and communicating this to our members.

With this in mind, Eleanor Stead, Deputy National Giving Advisor, will be leading a one-hour online session to explain how to encourage and develop legacy giving in your parish, how to develop policy on the use of gifts left to the church in this way, and also about the Church's partnership with Farewill, a free and professional will-writing service. This session will be held twice, on different days and at different times, in the hope that as many people as possible will be able to join and benefit from Eleanor's experience of how to encourage legacy giving to your church.

Parish Giving Scheme:

NEW: One-Off Giving Capability

With far fewer people carrying cash with them nowadays, it is important that churches are able to offer other ways in which people can give to the church. While many members of the congregation like to give in a planned and regular way, often direct via their bank and therefore not while they are physically in church, conversely, occasional visitors are more likely to want to make a single one-off gift whilst they are at the church building itself. This may be during festival services, such as Christmas or Harvest, at baptisms, confirmations, weddings and funerals, or just while popping in to look around the church during the day while it's open.



In response to this need, the <u>Parish Giving Scheme</u> is now able to receive and process one-off gifts on behalf of your church. Up until very recently, PGS has only been able to receive regular, planned gifts (monthly, quarterly, or annually) and it was necessary for the individual giver to register with PGS first in order to set up their regular gift.

Now it is possible for givers to make a one-off gift to their church via PGS without the need to register an account. They can do this either via a link on your church website/<u>A Church Near You</u> webpage, or by using their smart phone or tablet to read a QR code specific to your church. Either way, this takes the giver to your church's PGS landing page, where they can then make their one-off gift.

Your church's QR code can be placed on your service sheet, onto a pew card, or made into a poster for display, either inside or outside, to enable people to give to your church, both during services and at other times. It is also possible to make one-off gifts via PGS's dedicated phone line.

PGS claims, on your church's behalf, any eligible GiftAid on the one-off gift, just as it does with regular gifts, and transfers it to your church's bank account. In order for your church to be able to receive one-off gifts in this way, it will need to register with PGS, so that they can transfer the value of the gift, plus any GiftAid, directly to your church's bank account. The registration form can be found here. Registration and use of PGS is free for all parishes and churches within the Diocese of Lincoln.

The PGS office is finding that the ability for givers to make a one-off gift is proving to be an easy, non-threatening entry point to the idea of becoming a regular giver to their church. To date, nationally, 6% of those who have made a one-off gift to their church through PGS have subsequently become a regular giver.

The Generous Living Team is available to support you, including answering any questions your PCC members may have about PGS, processing your PGS Registration Form, helping you access your church's QR code, and promoting one-off and regular giving to your church.



Generosity: A Reflection

Our God is a generous God. We may hear these words often said in services or in talks we may have listened to, yet we might not always think about what that means for us as individuals and as a church. Generosity is a key characteristic of God and, because we are made in the image of God, it's a key characteristic we also have. God's generosity is seen in all sorts of ways, yet so often generosity is associated with money. Being generous with our money is important, yet we often miss out on other ways to be generous when our focus is completely on finance.

The Generous Living strategy that has been adopted by the Diocese also goes beyond just money. At its heart, the strategy is designed to encourage churches and individuals to live generously in response to the generosity we receive from God. There are five areas where, both as individuals and as churches, we can think about ways to be generous.

- Time how can we give of our time?
- Talent what talents and skills can we share with others?
- Treat how can we treat people with a generosity of spirit?
- Table how might we open our doors to welcome the newcomer, feed the hungry and support those in need?
- Treasure how can we bless others with our money?

Generous Living Enablers

Generosity is a core value of the Diocese of Lincoln and forms a key part of the Time To Change Together (TTCT) vision to be a sustainable church that is generous, collaborative and growing. It is our intention to support and resource parishes in a renewed culture of growing generosity, both individually as disciples and collectively as the People of God in that place. We wish to build a team of people, located within Deanery Partnerships supported by the Generous Living team based at the Parish Support Office, to promote, encourage and support local churches to develop cultures of generosity and to provide practical advice and help in increasing their income.

One of the ways in which we hope to do this is by recruiting and supporting a team of volunteer Generous Living Enablers. Generous Living Enablers will be a local contact point for churches and will play an important role in the delivery of the Generous Living strategy. In brief, this team would:

- Support churches and parishes as they develop and grow a culture of generous living
- Advise churches to enable giving; be involved in local covenant meetings
- Be part of the Deanery Partnership Steering Groups
- Support LMPs to make covenant pledges when required
- Promote a commitment to Generous Living and be a local advocate
- Share best practice and stories of generous living, giving and stewardship
- Contribute to the wider Generous Living network

The Covenant Scheme

90% of parishes have returned their Covenant Agreements. A big thank-you to all of those who have done so by making your pledges towards the cost of stipendiary ministry. It makes it possible to budget much more accurately and to plan for the deployment and pattern of ministry across the Diocese. The current indications are that, once Low Income Community (LInC) Funding and parishes' Covenant Pledges are added together and, having made some statistical assumptions and extrapolations based upon the 90% who have pledged, as a diocese we may get close to being able to afford the 100 stipendiary posts that we aspire to by 2025. This is encouraging, but it is important that momentum is maintained if we are to achieve that milestone.

Together, we now need to see through to completion the good work that has been accomplished to date. Without the remaining 10% of 'the jigsaw', it is proving difficult for the Deanery Partnerships and the parish support office to conclude the planning for the deployment and pattern of ministry.
